It is a particular joy for us to host the conference this year after a two-year break due to COVID. The conference this year will focus on our experience of worship within the liturgical space.



WHAT CAME FIRST: liturgy or the church building? Of course, both developed simultaneously. The first Christians met in private houses to celebrate the Eucharist, share the bread and their experiences of the risen Lord. Later they adapted existing architectural forms for

their gatherings - the Basilica type. With the growing power and influence of Christianity, did the seize of Church buildings first grow, requiring a more formal liturgy, or did the more elaborate forms of liturgy needed more space? What does this mean for today? Are we still able to fill these ancient "houses of god" with ... our prayer, our encounter with God and with the Holy? Do we still thirst for communion with the Lord and with each other?

THIS PAPER EXPLORES the recreation in early Anglo-Saxon England of a multisensory experience of architecture and liturgy as first intensively lived through in pilgrimages to Rome. It will concentrate on the activities of Bishop Wilfrid of Northumbria (634-710) as builder and artistic patron and consider how in his churches at Hexham and Ripon Wilfird endeavoured to captivate his intended audiences by involving their whole sensorium.



The Jewish Temples in History, the Heart and the **Imagination**

JONATHAN PRICE The Fred and Helen Lessing Chair of Ancient History, Tel Aviv University, Israel, Specialising in Greek and Roman Historiography, Jewish History of the Roman Period and Epigraphy.

TWO TEMPLES IN JERUSALEM have been built and destroyed, a

Third and Last Temple is the subject of Jewish daily prayer in the synagogue, which over the past 2000 years has become the locus for prayer, symbolic sacrifice,



communion, learning, contemplation, community. The synagogue is both communal and intimately private; silence is an essential part of liturgy; while the lips are silent the heart is astir; language becomes infinite. The prayer for a restored Temple is a prayer for time, not place; for peace, not power; for the logic of light.

Architectural Evocations of Jerusalem and Its **Temple in Early Roman Basilicas**

ROBIN JENSEN Patrick O'Brien Professor of Theology, Notre Dame University, United States of America, Specialising in History of Christianity, Liturgical Studies, and Christianity and Judaism in Antiquity.

HOW VISUAL REFERENCES to the Holy Land and the Jewish Temple in the mosaics adorning fifth- and sixth-century basilicas visually and imaginatively (re-)contextualize the New Jerusalem. Drawing upon the Book of Revelation, the iconography includes both natural elements (such as, rivers and trees) and architectural structures (city gates and building, for instance) to evoke the Heavenly City within a particular earthly one.


